She worked with JC Escalante to determine the equipment that was needed and then pursued an economical option through the manager of our local Best Buy. They did a great job.

In the Fall newsletter we let you know that a library renovation was under consideration. We are pleased to report that the project has been approved by the San Carlos City Council and funded by the City of San Carlos, San Mateo County Library and the San Carlos Friends of the Library. You will be hearing much more from us about this in the next few months as the budgets, plans and schedules are finalized. Many of you may have already noticed the architectural drawings that are hanging in the library along with carpet design samples. This is a very exciting project that will bring a much needed update to our well-loved but worn library.

## Dr. Books' List of Overlooked Classics

### You know the title, but have you read the book?

#### *Lord Chesterfield's Letters to His Son.*

Lord Chesterfield wrote incessantly to his (natural) son, showering him with sage advice on how to prepare for his future position in society. ["You will be of the House of Commons as soon as you are of age."] But Lord Chesterfield was a true 18th century man. His writings fell out of fashion for 200 years or so. Victorians considered him too worldly and cynical. Later readers resented his politely selfish creed. In the 21st century, however, we may call him insightful and pragmatic. Except that his style of writing is far too elegant, he could make a fortune producing best sellers of advice for business people and politicians, maintaining that to succeed one must be well bred and know how to please.

Here are his views on flattery:

"If you would gain the affection and friendship of particular people, whether men or women, endeavour to find out their predominant excellence, if they have one, and their prevailing weakness which everybody has; and do justice to the one, and

something more than justice to the other. Men have various objects in which they may excel, or at least would be thought to excel; and though they love to hear justice done to them, where they know that they excel, yet they are most and best flattered upon those points were they wish to excel, and are yet are doubtful whether they do or not. As for example: Cardinal Richelieu, who was undoubtedly the ablest statesman of this time, or perhaps of any other, had the idle vanity of wishing to be thought the best poet, too. Those, therefore, who flattered skillfully, said little to him of his abilities in state affairs...but the incense which they gave him—the smoke of which they knew would turn his head in their favour—was as a *bel esprit* and a poet. Why? Because he was sure of one excellency, and distrustful as to the other.

"You will easily discover every man's prevailing vanity by observing his favourite topic of conversation; for every many talks most of what he has most a mind to be thought to excel in. Touch him but there, and you touch

him to the quick...

"Do not mistake me, and think I mean to recommend to you abject and criminal flattery; no; flatter nobody's vices or crimes: on the contrary, abhor and discourage them. But there is no living in the world without a complaisant indulgence for people's weaknesses, and innocent, though ridiculous, vanities. If a man has a mind to be though wiser, and a woman handsomer, than they really are, their error is a comfortable one to themselves, and an innocent one with regard to other people; and I would rather make them my friends by indulging them in it, than my enemies by endeavouring (and that to no purpose) to undceive them."

According to Karen Clapper, chair of the FOL Fund-Raising Committee, plans for the remodel and samples of carpet and upholstery will be on display.


